New History Knowledge

- Know the lives of significant individuals beyond living memory / in the past who have contributed to national and international achievements
- Know what their contributions were and their significance locally and globally.
- Know that life and experiences were different in various periods in the past.
- Know that for much of history, helping people to heal has involved lots of superstition and guesswork, but that now modern science ensures that sensible treatments are used to help people get better
- Know that there have been particularly important nurses in history who are famous today because of the significant impact on many people's lives
- Know the key facts from the life stories of Florence Nightingale, Mary Seacole and Edith Cavell
- Know that the lives and actions of Florence Nightingale, Mary Seacole and Edith Cavell have similarities and differences
- Know that though nursing in the past was mainly undertaken by women, modern nursing is a career for people of all genders; know that, as an essential part of the NHS (National Health Service), the UK's nurses were celebrated for their work during the Covid-19 pandemic that began in 2019.

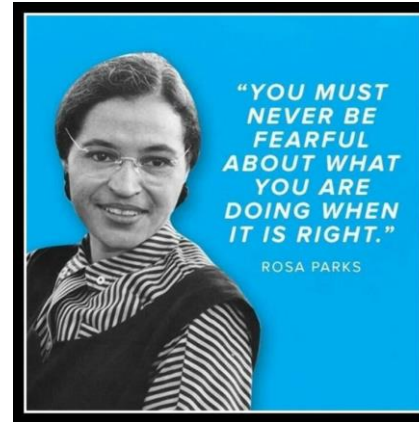
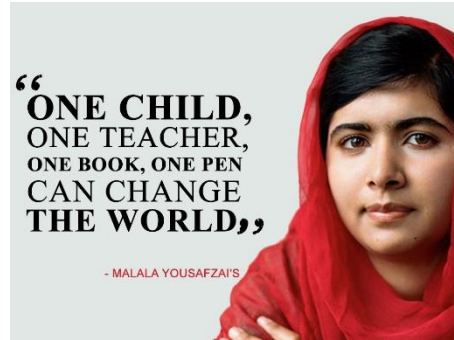
New History Skills
