Reading

Reading underpins children's access to the curriculum and clearly impacts on their achievement

We want children to love reading

Reading should be enjoyable



Learning to read should be a positive experience

The reading journey begins before children even begin to recognise the written form.

The English language has:-


• 26 letters



• 44 phonemes (sounds)



• Over 100 different ways to write those sounds





What is Phonics?

- Phonics is a way of teaching children how to read and write.
- It helps children hear, identify and use different sounds that distinguish one word from another in the English language
- Children are taught to read by breaking down words into the smallest unit of sounds, known as 'phonemes'. They are then taught how to blend these sounds together to read the whole word.

PHONEME = the sound GRAPHEME = the way it is written

- For reading: phonemes [sounds] associated with particular graphemes [letters] are pronounced in isolation and blended together (synthesised).
- For writing: Words are segmented into phonemes orally, and a grapheme written to represent each phoneme. There can be more than one way to spell a phoneme. E.g-the phoneme 'ay' is spelt differently in each of the words 'way', 'make', 'fail', 'great', 'sleigh' and 'lady'.

Once children are good with single phonemes...

DIGRAPHS – 2 letters that make 1 sound
 || ss zz oa ai

TRIGRAPHS – 3 letters that make 1 sound
 igh dge

Once children have a secure knowledge of a number of GPC's (Grapheme Phoneme Correspondences) and are confidently blending, they will be ready for reading books.

Prior to this they may have wordless books which develop great language skills, prediction, story telling and teach children the layout of books and how to handle books.









Shared Group Reading

3 sessions with the same book matched to children's secure phonic ability.

Day 1 – Decoding

- Sounds recall and practice
- Grapheme, tricky words and new vocabulary flashcards
- Repeated readings and teacher moves round rather than letting one child read aloud at a time

Day 2 – Prosody

- Reading with expression and intonation
- Choose page to focus on. Repeat after me. Why do we stress certain words? 'It was a BIG mess'

Day 3 – Comprehension

- 'I know the answer because ...'
- Prove it. Explain it.

This book then comes home. When children take their book home to read they should be 95% fluent. Please do not worry that a book is too easy – your child needs to develop fluency and confidence in reading. Re-reading a book they have had before helps develop fluency – this is the goal.

Celebrate their success!

Supporting at home Reading for pleasure books



'Sharing book' -

Your child might be able to read much of this book on their own, as parts are decodable. In order to encourage your child to become a lifelong reader, it is important that they learn to read for pleasure.

Library book -

Children **may not** be able to read this book independently but these books offer a wealth of opportunities for talking about the pictures and enjoying the story or information text. Enjoy the book together and foster a love of reading. Hearing stories is equally important as it means that children can focus on the language without having to spend their time decoding.

What else can you do at home?

- Please look at the Little Wandle videos and guidance for parents (correct pronunciation is key)
- Support children in learning the code
- Let your child "show off" their reading to you and celebrate and praise all the way!
- Share and read books with/to your children for pleasure
- Join the library and encourage good reading habits
- Engage in phonic home learning tasks (flashcards round the house, chalk writing outside, segment and cut up words to put back together,
- Practice the automatic reading of tricky words


- Most important thing From a very early age...
 - Talking and Listening.
 - Reading with and to your child
 - Playing listening games
 - Singing songs and rhymes
 - Simple movement games

All these things will help to build up connections in the brain, an enjoyment of language and confidence to try things out.

Play 'I Spy' games. Can you find words beginning with ...? Can you find a picture of a ...? How many ... can you see?

Ask Questions

Ask questions about the story as you read it e.g. What is the story about? Why do you think they made that choice? Was it a good choice? Why did that happen? What do you think will happen next? What was your favourite part of the story? Why?

Make it Fun Be Seen

Enjoyreading together. Give characters funny voices and engage with the pictures. Make a game out of finding words that rhyme or start with the same sound.

Create

Use reading to inspire drawings or new stories.

Make sure you are seen reading. Keep books magazines at easy reach.

Get Out

Go to your public library regularly. Find the books you loved as a kid to read together.

Go Online

Look online & in app stores for appropriate word & spelling games.

Make Space

Have a special place or a certain time when you read together.

Read everything out loud.

Books, poems, nursery rhymes, newspaper & magazine articles, food labels... anything that is close to hand!
