
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Onomatopoeia



Speech Bubbles

Speech bubbles are usually round or square shapes with a tail pointing to the characters mouth, indicating that the character is speaking out loud.

 A scream bubble indicates a character is screaming or shouting and has a jagged outline or a thicker line. The letters are usually larger or bolder than normal. A whisper bubble shows that the speaker is talking in a softer or quieter tone.
 They are usually drawn with a dashed/dotted outline, smaller letters, and a paler writing.

 Thought bubbles are cloud-shaped word bubbles that indicate that a character is thinking, not talking out loud.
