

CURRICULUM IN ACTION

RECEPTION

Over the past couple of weeks, we have been learning about our families. The children have been talking about their family, who lives in their house and what activities they enjoy doing with their family. We drew pictures and wrote about our families.


YEAR 1

We are approaching the end of a fantastic first half term and our topic, 'Home Sweet Home'. Yesterday, we were lucky to have a visit from Mr Carstairs, the Victorian butler, who took the children back in time to when there were no washing machines, electricity or indoor toilets! We hope to share some photos soon.

This week, the children had the opportunity to share their 'home' projects with their peers. They were encouraged to share important information about their creations, how they made it, what was tricky, what bit they liked doing the most etc. Talking about their own creations promotes a deeper level of learning. Peer presentations help students develop essential communication skills as well as boosting students' self-confidence. Different children speaking enrich the learning experience for everyone and often results in higher levels of engagement.



In 1M, the children have been using part whole models which is the concept of how numbers can be split into parts. Children using this model will see the relationship between the whole number and the component parts. This helps children make the connections between addition and subtraction. We will move on to subtraction next week.


YEAR 2

We have been very busy over the last 2 weeks. The children all looked fabulous in their costumes for our dress up day and we enjoyed a visit from CREW where they learnt more facts about Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole as well as demonstrating their own knowledge.

In English, we have been creating our own diary entries based on the book 'Speak Up'. The children have also begun the skill of editing and have been looking at ways to spot their mistakes as well as improve their writing.

In art, we have continued our study of the artist LS Lowry and the children have recreated his famous portrait 'Ann'. In science, the children have continued their learning about microhabitats and examining a habitat in closer detail.

Here is just a small sample of what Year 3 have been learning about this past fortnight, as we approach the end of our first half-term...












In Science, we learnt how fossils are created and then had a go at creating our own. We did this by imprinting mini dinosaur skeletons in to clay. The results were very realistic!





Year 5 Curriculum in Action










<u>Art</u>


The children have been focussing on describing a Victorian character; they have created their own characters and then have written descriptions using figurative language and ambitious vocabulary.













YEAR 6


