Gospel music

- Developed after the American Civil War (1865).
 - Church based music used for worship.
- Influenced by several African American styles, including Spirituals and Blues.
 - Described as 'composed folk songs'.
 - Almost always accompanied, and have verses and choruses.



Spirituals are songs that were composed by enslaved African people in the USA. Gospel music grew out of these songs. American Civil War 1861-1865 slavery ended in America in 1865.
