Message from Headteacher:

Dear Parent/Carer,

The arrival of the Summer term is just around the corner, we have a lot of things to look forward to during the summer months for example the annual Summer Carnival. As the weather starts to get warmer, students are encouraged to wear the Summer Uniform, information on this can be found inside the newsletter. In a recent curriculum experience students in Year 3 through Year 6 were offered a remarkable opportunity to delve into another era using virtual reality (VR) headsets. This innovative endeavour marked a new frontier for us, and the experience was nothing short of extraordinary! I had the privilege of accompanying one of the Year 3 classes on Monday afternoon as they embarked on a journey to explore daily life in Ancient Rome. The immersion was truly astounding – standing amidst the bustling streets of a Roman market felt surreal yet captivating. It was an experience akin to being transported back in time, vividly enhancing the classroom learning and breathing life into historical concepts like never before. While Y3's experienced Ancient Rome, Y4 were immersed in Ancient Greece, Y5 were introduced to the Mayans and Y6 were challenged with Climate Change and Environmental Studies.

CURRICULUM IN ACTION

RECEPTION

Over the last few weeks we have continued to be inspired by traditional tales focusing on 'The Gingerbread Man', 'The Three Little Pigs' and 'Little Red Riding Hood'. The children enjoyed decorating their own gingerbread men, both as biscuits and on paper, and enjoyed retelling the story using repeated phrases. While reading The Three Little Pigs we made our own houses out of different materials, printed with pigs and helped clean a few too! The children learnt the importance of not speaking to strangers when reading 'Little Red Riding Hood'. The children enjoyed making cakes for Granny.

In Maths we have learning about number bonds to 10 using the language including 'part, part, whole'. We have focused on doubling 6,7, 8, 9 and 10 and developing our knowledge of odd and even numbers. We have been learning the names of 3D shapes and made repeating patterns.

Like the rest of the school, we celebrated World Book Day and Science Week. Reception children were lucky enough to be read to by Year 5 on World Book Day as well as joining Key Stage 1 for an assembly to share our fantastic costumes. We have been exploring shadows as part of Science Week. We created our own 'big bad wolf' shadow puppets and investigated how to make the shadows taller or shorter.

As the days become brighter, we have taken time to think about entering Spring. We went for a 'Spring Walk' around school looking for signs in nature and have spent time creating Spring flowers.

It has been another busy half term and we are very proud of how engaged the children have been with our 'Once Upon a Time' topic. Wishing you all a wonderful Easter holidays!



Year 1 – Curriculum In Action

SCIENCE

For the past couple of weeks we have been observing the growth of plants that have been placed in different places around the classroom.

We found out that sunlight and water were important to grow a healthy plant however a plant without sun would still grow but would not be green.



ART: We have spent this half term exploring how artists use colour, texture and pattern in both paintings and sculpture. This week we finished painting our clay sculptures of flowers and plants using primary and mixing to create secondary colours.









Our summer 1 topic is titled 'Africa is not a country' where we will be focusing on the continent of Africa, its weather, landscapes, landmarks and animals.

I cannot believe that we are at the end of another term. It has certainly been a busy one for Year 2. We finished our topic on Monarchs and designed some amazing castles. We have been looking at making pictograms in Computing and have enjoyed using the ICT room this term. Design Technology - Shaduf

In DT, we have been learning about how the Egyptians created and built a moving mechanism called a shaduf. A shaduf is an irrigation tool that is used to lift water from a water source onto land or into another waterway or basin and is highly efficient. The mechanism of a shaduf includes a long counterbalanced pole on a pivot, with a bucket attached to the end of it. We have had fun building our own functioning shaduf in class using sticks, string and modelling clay.














History - Benin Bronze

In History, we have been on an amazing learning journey discovery all there is to know about Ancient Benin. We have learnt a great deal about the Creation of Benin leading to the Benin Artefacts we see in our British museum today. One of the most significant artefacts are the Benin Bronzes which once decorated the Benin royal palace and which provide an important historical record of the Kingdom of Benin.


Traffic and parking is everyones responsibility. Do the right thing!

During a visit to the Wallace Collection, Year 6 children explored the outdoors through landscape and seascape paintings. They learnt about the principles of composition and the use of perspective. Working with an artist, they developed new vocabulary to understand and discuss landscape as a genre of painting. Inspired by artists such as Rubens, Canaletto and Salvator Rosa, they created their own drawings.



During their D.T. lessons, Year 6 children investigated cushions, created mood boards, and honed their sewing skills to embellish and personalize their very own cushions! They went through a step-by-step process to bring their creative visions to life. They began by exploring different types of cushions and materials, discovering how colours and patterns can influence mood and style.

With these inspirations in mind, they then created mood boards, carefully selecting fabrics, patterns, and textures to perfectly match their design ideas They acquired practical skills essential for embellishing their cushions, using a sewing machine to stitch their chosen fabrics together. Alongside the stitching techniques, they explored different ways to add style and flair to their cushions, including decorative buttons, ribbons, and even embroidery!
