

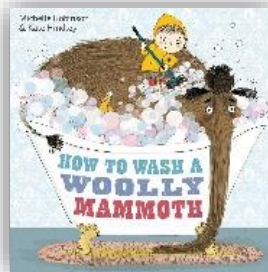

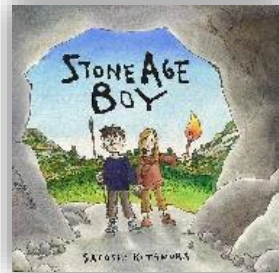


## How to Wash a Woolly Mammoth – Instructional Writing

**Purpose** – to inform

**Audience** – Owners of a woolly mammoth

**Features** – Bullet pointed list, imperative verbs, time adverbials, numbered instructions



## Stone Age Boy – Diary Entry

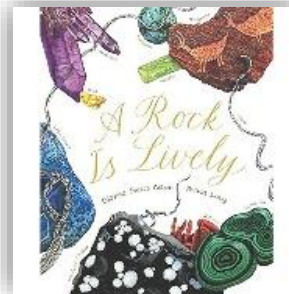
**Purpose** – to inform

**Audience** – Child from the Stone Age

**Features** – Past tense, varied sentence types, 1st person, feelings/thoughts/facts, informal language, date, 'Dear Diary', Introduction, Main Body, Sign Off

### Your writing expectations checklist:

- Vary the length of sentences within a single piece of writing.
- Use punctuation consistently and correctly.
- Use a range of conjunctions (including: when, if, because, although) to write extended sentences with more than one clause.
- Present their work neatly.
- Identify possible improvements to grammar and vocabulary.
- To use a dictionary to check spelling and definition of a word.
- Be able to use a range of features in their writing confidently that include rhyming words, alliteration, simile and onomatopoeia.



## A Rock is Lively - Poetry

**Purpose** – to entertain

**Audience** – KS2 children who enjoy poetry

**Features** – Alliteration, rhyming words, simile, onomatopoeia, metaphor, verses/stanza

## PUNCTUATION MARKS

**Full Stop**



Shows the end of a sentence

**Question Mark**



Shows that a question is being asked

**Comma**



Joins two or more ideas in a sentence or separates items in a series

**Exclamation Mark**



Shows strong emphasis or strong emotion

### adjective:

a word that explains more about a noun's size, shape, age, color, origin, purpose, or material

- big - That's a **big** table.
- chocolate - I love **chocolate** cake.
- French - Look at my **French** clock.

### Co-ordinating Conjunctions



These words join words, phrases and clauses.

### CONJUNCTIONS

Conjunctions are words that "join" ideas together. A conjunction joins two parts of a sentence, two nouns, or two verbs together.
