

3D Art and Sculpture

Lesson sequence

Lesson 1: To explore the work of artists and sculptors and describe them.

Lesson 2: To create observational drawings of the natural environment.

Lesson 3: To develop ideas for a flower sculpture.

Lesson 4: To explore paper sculpting techniques and to use them to create a paper sculpture.

Lesson 5: To create my sculpture.

Lesson 6: To paint and evaluate my sculpture.

Key themes / topic overview

During this topic you will be exploring sculptures and 3D art. To begin, we will revisit our shading techniques and use this as a basis for our work on observational skills and drawing of figures.

We will then explore some artists and sculptors, some of whom base their art around the natural environment.

This will then build onto *drawing and making flowers using different media (2D and 3D) and looking at larger and smaller scale art. Where we will explore how combinations of materials such as wire, paper, fabric, string, card can be transformed into sculpture, discovering how best to manipulate them (cut, tear, bend, fold) and fasten them together (tie, bind, stick) (e.g. Drawing and making flowers).*

We will finish by working with clay to make a floral sculpture.

At the end of the topic, we will share our work and express our thoughts. We will listen to each other's opinions about what we have made as we evaluate our work.

Vocabulary

Artist: a person who creates art (such as painting or sculpture)

Sculpture: the art of making 2D or 3D representations or abstract forms, especially by carving stone, wood or by casting metal or plaster.

Sculptor: an artist who makes sculptures.

Figurative: a term that refers to the representation of the human figure.

Nature: the physical world and everything in it that has not been made by people.

Technique: a skilful or effective way of doing something.

Sculpting: to create or represent something by carving, casting or other shaping techniques.

Adhesive: a substance used to stick objects or materials together e.g. glue.

Malleable material: a material that can be changed in shape.

Rigid material: a material that cannot be changed or adapted in shape.
